INTRODUCTION

Species at Risk are organisms with declining populations that are at risk of becoming extinct or extirpated (disappearing from a certain area). Aquatic ecosystems in Alberta support at risk species such as the woodland caribou, bull trout, long-toed salamander, whopping crane and northern leopard frog.

There are many factors that can lead a species to become at risk, one of which is the introduction of invasive species. Aquatic invasive species such as goldfish, zebra mussels and quagga mussels out compete native species when introduced and can impact the overall health of aquatic ecosystems.

 - What is the provincial fish of Alberta?
 - Which 3 species of trout have a "threatened" status?
 - What is 1 thing you can do to help trout?
- 4. Use the Caribou Poster to answer the following questions:
 - What special type of wetland provides important habitat for caribou?
 - What type of food does a caribou dig for with its hooves?
 (It is commonly found in wetlands!)

Ways you can help:

- ✓ Never release aguarium or pond fish into a water body.
- ✓ Clean, drain and dry all your boating and fishing gear.
- ✓ Boaters and anglers must be licensed and understand the fishing regulations when fishing.
- ✓ Learn how to identify fish species and if you catch a fish you don't know then always let it go! Place any unused bait back in original container and then in the garbage - not in the water.
