Overview

Thanks to the support of our Forestry Futures Alliance Partners, CAREERS and Work Wild, Inside Education brought another successful forest field trip season to the beginning of the 2023-2024 school year.

Students and teachers from urban, rural and Indigenous communities across Alberta participated in programming at the following field sites:

- Bunchberry Meadows Conservation Area (Edmonton)
- Des Crossley Demonstration Forest (Rocky Mountain House)
- Boreal Wetland Centre at Evergreen Park (Grande Prairie)
- Gregoire Lake Provincial Park (Regional Municipality of Wood Buffalo)
- Huestis Demonstration Forest (Whitecourt)
- Three Herons Conservation Area (Diamond Valley)

More than 2,600 students and nearly 300 teachers and volunteers participated in programming from September - October 2023.

We are pleased to share the highlights from the 2023 fall field season.





Participants and Program Impact

A total of 2,676 students from 115 classes at 47 unique schools attended forest field programs at Inside Education field sites in September and October, 2023.



Program Feedback

After each field program, a survey is sent to participating teachers so Inside Education can evaluate the effectiveness of our student forestry field trip programming. The charts below summarize the responses of participants.

Overall, the responses indicate that our forest field programs play a vital role in accessible forest education through low-cost programming and professional program leaders. We continue to link to curriculum objectives and expose students to a variety of forest and forestry perspectives.



Average overall value rating of forest field programming:

9.4/10

Edmonton Area - Bunchberry Meadows

Bunchberry Meadows is a unique Nature Conservancy of Canada site that serves Edmonton-area schools. It features mixed woodlands and wetlands on a 260 hectare property.

While Bunchberry Meadows was our busiest site this fall, it also consistently has the highest proportion of senior high school participation. Notably, during this fall season Inside Education collaborated with fellow FFA member CAREERS to host students from the Braided Journeys program, an initiative by the Edmonton Catholic School District to support Indigenous students and provide them with career opportunities. Students joined Inside Education staff to explore activities related to forestry and conservation careers.

Des Crossley Demonstration Forest

Des Crossley Demonstration Forest is a fantastic site for students to explore their relationship to the land in the context of forest management. As a former research site, it showcases the long-term effects of different management techniques.

As our Central Alberta site, Des Crossley
Demonstration Forest sees students visiting
from a wide geographical range. Classes
make the trip from as close as nearby Rocky
Mountain House, to as far away as
Cochrane. Many of these schools are rural
schools with limited access to field trip
experiences.

Boreal Wetland Centre at Evergreen Park

The Boreal Wetland Centre is managed by Ducks Unlimited and includes wetland, forest, and natural resource education components. It is located at the edge of Grande Prairie in Evergreen Park and serves the north west corner of the province.

Over 300 students attended this fall over only 6 programming days. Notably, students from many rural areas participated this fall - including the communities of Donnelly, Fairview, and Sexsmith. Some students got to witness active arachnid research in action with Jaime Pinzon of Natural Resources Canada, as they were at the site collecting data this fall.

Inside Education and Ducks Unlimited also welcomed Leanne Courchesne and Manny Corpas from program partner Alliance Pipeline to tour the site and see experiential learning in action.

Gregoire Lake Provincial Park

At Gregoire Lake Provincial Park, Inside Education collaborates with Alberta Parks, which allows us access to this site outside of their regular public season. This provides students from the Regional Municipality of Wood Buffalo space to explore and enjoy an otherwise very busy site!

Like most of Alberta, the Wood Buffalo area struggled with high AQHI due to wildfire smoke this fall. Unfortunately this resulted in two cancelled field trips, and one modified program this season.

Huestis Demonstration Forest

Huestis Demonstration Forest is a 10 km² section of boreal forest that exhibits sustainable forest management for students in the forestry communities surrounding Whitecourt.

The fall field season at Huestis included three elementary classes, as well as a one-day special event called Women in Outdoor Careers, which connected female students in the area with women who work in traditionally male-dominated natural resource careers

Three Herons Conservation Area & Jumpingpound Demonstration Forest - Calgary Area

Three Herons is a small Nature Conservancy of Canada site that serves schools from south Calgary and the Diamond Valley area. It is a diverse riparian area featuring mixed forest and shrubland.

We typically run a conservation, water, and wildlife program unique to Three Herons. However, this year Three Herons was used as an alternative location for forest field trips originally scheduled for Jumpingpound Demonstration Forest due to a unexpected closure.

The Jumpingpound closure resulted in additional classes at Three Herons, and another nine classes did field trip in urban parks (Bowness & Cochrane Ranche). Unfortunately we also had five cancellations related to the closure.

In addition to our regular field programs we also hosted a one-day Women in Outdoor Careers special event where female students from Calgary-area schools connected with women with various outdoor careers.
